


IT'S TRAVEL TIME!

There are 17 of us who are counting down our days before heading to Kenya... We depart on January 2nd! After planning for a year, the time has almost arrived. We will be visiting several of our current computer labs, as well as looking at a few potential new labs' spaces. We will share a Grand Opening ceremony with one of our new labs, SARDI, and spend some wonderful time at our very first computer lab, G-BIACK, who continues to empower a large number of students with their <u>Girls Empowerment Program</u> (GEP). We will be in Kenya for 16 days and would love your prayers for our safe travels.

Our travelers have all paid their way for this journey. We like to share this because all of the donated funds we receive go towards all of the Connection Ubuntu work. It's an expensive trip but these travelers understand how life-changing these labs are to the students. They are looking forward to seeing the labs in person, along with meeting our partners, who work so very hard to make sure their facilities are doing everything possible to help students get digital skills.

We are also having our "first ever" Partner Summit Meeting, in Kisumu, Kenya. About 32 of our computer lab directors will be in attendance. GRADUATES FROM RESCUE WING KENYA!

<u>Rescue Wing Kenya</u> held graduation for their computer class this past November. We are happy to share photos of their students. On average, they have between 30 to 70 female students in their classes so they not only meet our requirements of 50% girl students in the classroom, they have 100%! We're so proud of the work they do. They are located in the <u>Kakuma Refugee Camp</u>, in Kakuma, Kenya. Refugees in the Kakuma camp have real hurdles to get over due to government restrictions. See below:

- 1. Refugees are only allowed to make \$60 per month, and most people do not make even that much.
- 2. They must have written documents to leave the camp, which is not easily obtained.
- 3. Restricted movement of refugees results in reduced livelihood opportunities and contributes to reliance on humanitarian assistance.
- Restricted movement leaves refugees with a sense of hopelessness. The inability to freely leave the camp kills their dreams, limits their thinking, and inhibits them from leading fulfilling lives.

As you can see, it is not an easy place to live and be prosperous. They do have schools, although they are terribly inadequate due to lack of teachers, and they also have health facilities, but these are just very basic. Because it is hard for refugees to get a pass to leave the camp, they do not have good resources for education and good health.

Rescue Wing Kenya and the other eleven computer labs we have in the Kakuma Refugee Camp are attempting to assist with the lack of education, especially digital literacy, and we are so proud of their work. Their biggest struggle is Wi-Fi for internet. This has a huge impact on the success of their students. Monthly cost of Wi-Fi for a lab is approximately \$65. As you can see, refugees don't even make this much in one month. If you would like to assist one of these labs with their cost of Wi-Fi, please contact us... we'll be happy to connect you with them! Director, Erick Josue, shares these words, "Today is our ladies' day, opening a new chapter after receiving their certificate in Basic Computer Program. They took a new road of building a bright future and most of them have strong faith and big dreams to accomplish. Let's support them to plant the seeds of hope in their journey.



MEET OUR NEWEST BOARD MEMBER!





OUR QUARTERLY REPORT STATISTICS



These totals are for the months of August, September, October and November. We had 32 labs reporting from a total of 34 labs currently operating. We added seven new labs in October and their computers should arrive in January. Their first reporting period will be July of 2024. We require labs to have 50% female students and are thrilled to see that this quarter they have reached 66%!

In December, Community Refuge, Orphan, Disabled, Enable Vulnerable Unit (CRODEVU), Humanity Hands (formerly INVER), and LakeHub Academy were released from our 2 year requirements of providing quarterly computer lab reports. We wish them well for their futures. May they continue to change lives in their communities.
